



Within the PE department of Garnock Community Campus, there are various activities that take place in and out of the classroom that provide an enjoyable and educational experience for the young people of Garnock.

Sports Teams

The Higher pupils were rewarded with a visit from a local star athlete, Jemma Reekie on 30th October. Jemma is a former pupil of Garnock and has most notably won the European Championship for the 1500m in July 2017, with a time of 4 minutes 13.25 seconds. However, in July of this year Jemma produced a new personal best in the same event, finishing with a time of 4 minutes 9.05 seconds.

Jemma's visit provided an opportunity for the Higher pupils to see first hand the rewards of competing and winning at the top end of athletics. Jemma's visit also highlighted relevant information for the higher pupils in relation to their course. Miss Reekie spoke of the mental preparation she would go through before participating in her event, the different methods of motivation she utilised within training and competitions, and also the social inclusion with her athletics event. Jemma provided first-hand information that the Higher pupils can utilise within their coursework.



Garnock's netball teams have recently produced some excellent performances and results. At the tail end of October, the S1 team won 11-0, whilst the S2 team won 11-8, and the seniors completed the treble, winning 35-12, all against Largs Academy. In addition to this, the seniors also won 49-32 against Louden Academy which puts them through to the Gold League in the Open Scottish Cup.





The S1 and S3 football teams are both still in the Scottish cup, with the S1's playing Williamwood High School and the S3's playing Strathaven High School, both in the 3rd round. The S2 team unfortunately lost their 2nd round Scottish cup tie away to Hamilton College, the game finished 1-1 with the Garnock boys losing out on penalties. Scorer and man of the match in that game was Lewis Boyce.

S2 Pupils across the curriculum are also working hard in a variety of different discipline of interest to them, particularly in Music and Drama, preparing to deliver the school show later in the session.

Our coming focus is Option Choices as we go from S2 to S3 and an evening was held on 21st November (PowerPoint on the school Website). The evening was very well attended by S2 parents and pupils and the options process was explained in depth. Our first options assembly will take place in mid-December and will be followed up by lots of options activities which will conclude with pupils having a Pastoral or SLT interview to decide their final options before being signed off by parents. The process closes on Friday 1st March and we are hopeful that our new timetable will begin (earlier this year) with pupils starting their new subject choices mid-

MR SCOTT

Since the start of the session in August, pupils have been working hard in their classes across the curriculum and particularly so in Languages (English, Spanish, and French). The outstanding work the pupils displayed, meant that Languages' Staff planned a reward trip for S2 to one of the local cinemas. This happened on Tuesday 13th November and pupils had a hugely successful day seeing 'Black Panther'. We were delighted when staff at the cinema commented again on how behaved our pupils were.

During the session so far, S2 pupils have being enjoying the BGE film club at lunchtimes as well as the Creative Writing club in English. Both supporting their development in literacy and language.

Our S2 girls' netball teams were involved in an Inter-House netball team recently - thoroughly enjoying the competition between the school's four houses. Likewise, so did our boys' football teams. All involved thoroughly enjoying the experience and both sets of teams helped make significant contributions to their house's points

In October, around 30 S2 pupils attended Arran Outdoor Centre to build on leadership, listening, communication, organisational skills and teamwork activities. During the week they got to take part in a number of exciting adventure activities such as abseiling and orienteering, as well as climbing to the top of Goat Fell. Unfortunately, due to stormy weather the group had to come home one day early and missed their final day. However, all found the experience quite amazing. One pupil I spoke to said, "I have never done anything like that before, I absolutely loved the abseiling and our whole time there. I learned so much about myself and how to use the strengths of other people in teams". Back in school, following up on the week, pupils will now use the skills they learned to complete their S2 Leadership course. Here they are expected to complete various units including a block on enterprise, volunteering and physical activity.


Our school teams in PE continue to thrive in their afterschool clubs as do our punils in music who often also work on their instruments at lunchtime, attendance in both is strong.

S3 pupils continue to work really well in classes across the school. I have observed many examples of excellent work and strong relationships on many occasions.

We are now at the stage in S3 where we are considering options for the Senior Phase and National Qualification. During the recent information evening we heard from Ayrshire College and SDS (Skills Development Scotland) about flexible career pathways and the many opportunities available to young people. I also detailed the timeline we will be following when the process begins. I will issue more information in the New Year.

S3 pupils will be given the opportunity for a work placement in early May. However, the planning for this begins in January. Mr Gillespie will be the teacher that leads this. I would encourage as many pupils as possible to undertake this valuable experience as in many cases it reaffirms potential career pathways. It also provides young people with a glimpse of life outside of school, which, for some, can be a real eye-opener.

Looking further ahead, during the summer term S3 pupils undertake the National Tests in Reading, Writing and Numeracy. These are mandatory and are set by the Scottish Government. I will issue information closer to the time.

The level of teaching and learning for S4 students remains high as we approach exam time. Initially they will undertake Estimate Exams; these begin on Monday 21st Jan, and then final exams, which start on Thursday 25th April. Students should, by now, be preparing whole heartedly with a thorough study plan that should include studying on top of any homework which is issued on a regular basis. Demonstrating this level of commitment

The vast majority of subject areas will be part of the Estimate Exam Diet and timetables will be issued in due course. There are some subjects which have chosen to hold their exams within class time. If this is the case class teachers will fully inform all candidates.

now will have longer term benefits.

During the Estimate Exams there is no study leave and all pupils are expected to attend every day. At this time during classes it can be an opportunity for candidates to undertake pieces of coursework that make up part of nearly all SQA courses. All coursework is individual and can be viewed as an extended assessment. Coursework contributes a percentage of the final grade in all subjects. The figure for each subject area varies.

You will receive information regarding performance during Estimate Exams via the usual Tracking report.

Whilst the focus is clearly upon National Qualifications for S4 students, we will begin the process of choosing subjects for S5 immediately after the Estimate Exams. At this time students move from six subjects in S4 to five in S5 and whilst we push for highest possible achievement in S4, Higher remains the gold standard in Scottish Education. Students will have the same level of input as last session regarding advice and help when making choices.

MR DUFF

It is a busy year for my S5 pupils. They are working towards exams and appreciating the amount of hard work and self-motivation required especially in the move from National 5 to Higher. I have been impressed by the dedication of many of them to their studies - attending Supported Study, staying behind to complete task or to study, approaching staff for guidance. A list of supported study opportunities for the forthcoming months will be issued in the very near future. In addition that the study on Wednesday and I am running Supervised Study on Wednesday and Thursday after school from 3.15pm - 4.15pm. During this time I will run mini workshops of study planning, study skills and managing stress as well as general help with studies.

New to the curriculum this year has been the chance for our S5 pupils to undertake Foundation Apprentices through Ayrshire College. This is a two year commitment and involves attending the college two afternoons a week for one year and then work experience in the second year. Six pupils have chosen this option studying a range of professions - Childcare, Construction, Engineering, Beauty Skills, Bakery and Civil Engineering. Feedback from the college has been very positive and the pupils are gaining valuable skills and experience.

This year we have introduced S5 Ambassadors. This is open to all pupils in S5 and allows senior pupils to become involved in school events such as Parents' Nights and Curricular Events as well as being role models to younger pupils through their conduct in the school. I am delighted that 25 S5 pupils have put themselves forward to be Ambassadors.

I have been very proud of many of the S5 pupils in their volunteering ranging from running sports clubs for the primary school, working with the junior football team as coaches to supporting S1 and S2 pupils in class. And, as always, the pupils involved in Music Clubs and Events continue to do the school proud through their talents and commitment. Well done to all.

In a similar vein, a large number of our S6 pupils have volunteered to mentor pupils in S4, sharing their learning experiences and revision techniques with their younger colleagues, better preparing those who the school has identified as needing support for their SQA examinations.

Our next focus for S6 pupils is their own mock exams, beginning with English before Christmas and following with the other subjects afterwards. We wish every pupil the very best success in these practice exams and know they will provide excellent preparatory work for the final SQA exams later in the year.

National 5 5 Early Education and Childcare pupils put their theoretical learning into practice when leading play experiences for younger children. They had to plan the age appropriate activities to help support a specific aspect of development, prepare all resources, then lead the different activities. On the day we had, water play looking at buoyancy and sinking, technology play using apps on an I-Pad, Discovery play, developing fine motor skills and creativity with play do, language enrichment through reading stories, games through playing balloon volleyball and an energetic just dance session. The pull deartiested and provided the first stories and keeping a very energetic 2 year old captivated and engaged for the full double period. It was so good that the two year old has requested to come back again for more.

Higher Childcare and Development students have been carrying out various experiments to prove or disprove various aspects of different Educational Theorists. They spent a few weeks researching Jean Piaget's theory of cognitive development, studying his research methods and the experiments he used to come up with his theory. The pupils then created their own versions of these tests and carried them out with a class visitor to assess which stage they were in. The pupils also prepared and participated in a class debate: Piaget vs Vygotsky: who's theory best explains cognitive development? After a very interesting debate with great arguments put forwards from both sides our guest judge, School librarian Mrs Gillespie, who led the school debating club picked team Vygotsky as the winners "They had a slightly clearer explanation of his theory and were better able to articulate how it impacts current educational practices.'



Rural Skills

S4 rural skills have been enhancing their skills in the local community be helping out at the Garnock Valley Allotment Association. Every Friday morning the class have spent a few hours carrying out various task including cutting and strimming the grass, painting planters, creating an irrigation system to collect water and harvesting potatoes. The pupils have really enjoyed putting their skills to good use in a relevant context and supporting the community while they are working towards their qualifications.

The S3 Rural skills class are participating in the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) Green Plan It challenge. After visiting the Botanical Gardens in Edinburgh the launch the challenge and get the brief, the class have been busy planning their very own community garden area. As part of the process the pupils have had to work together as a team to produce a 3D scale model of their idea, including some computer Generated designs. The model is coming together well and the pupils are now focusing on developing their presentation skills to go back for the final part of the challenge and display their final design.










